DOMINICAN REPUBLIC DEPO BASICS

When it's time to schedule your deposition in the Dominican Republic, we want you to have the most comprehensive information available at your fingertips. That is why our experts have put together this easy-to-follow guide on setting up a deposition in the Dominican Republic. First, let's answer some of the most important questions:

1

Are depositions permitted in the Dominican Republic?

Yes, taking U.S. depositions in the Dominican Republic is permissible and in general, you can depose willing witnesses in the Dominican Republic without any special formalities or involvement of foreign courts.

2

Can depositions in the Dominican Republic take place at any venue?

Yes, depositions in the Dominican Republic can take place at the venue of your choosing, whether that be a hotel, law firm office, conference room, or videoconferencing facility.

Does a U.S. passport holder need a visa to enter the Dominican Republic?

U.S. passport holders may enter the Dominican Republic for up to 90 days for tourist purposes without a visa. However, a business visa is required for travelers with business, professional or commercial purposes. You can find out more [here](#).

How early should we plan for a deposition in the Dominican Republic?

Give yourself about 4 weeks to plan. The further you plan ahead, the more likely it is that you'll be able to locate and book the right professionals for your deposition.

Are there court reporters in the Dominican Republic?

Optima Juris has local court reporters in the Caribbean, which means little to no travel costs for you.

Depo Options: should the attorney attend the depo in person or remotely?



Attending Deposition In-Person

Attorneys, court reporters, legal videographers, and/or deposition interpreters travel to the location of the witness.

Advantages:

Typically this an ideal scenario to get the clearest record and you are less likely to encounter technical issues.

Disadvantages:

Travel costs can add up quickly.



Videoconference Facility

Attorneys participate remotely at a videoconference facility. Reporter, videographer, and interpreter should attend deposition with the witness.

Advantages:

Videoconferencing offers the most reliable remote connection and allows attorneys to see the witness while not having to travel to the deposition destination.

Disadvantages:

Videoconference facilities are expensive. Costs typically fall within the USD \$400 per-hour range.



DepoAnywhere™ Web-based Videoconferencing

Attorneys participate remotely via a web-based videoconference solution that connects on any laptop, smartphone or tablet.*

Advantages:

Cost-effective solution for minor witnesses, sworn statements, or when your budget is really tight. DepoAnywhere™ includes a backup telephone dial-in feature, and an Optima Juris team member to monitor your connection to provide real-time help.

Disadvantages:

Remote connections can be prone to pauses, interruptions, and/or connection lost due to network issues.

*For the best and clearest record we always recommend that the court reporter, videographer and interpreter be physically present with the witness.

How can we swear in a witness outside of the U.S.?

When attorneys need to swear in witnesses abroad, the time-honored solution is for both sides to stipulate on the record that the court reporter can swear in the witness. Using a U.S. certified court reporter is not enough, because notary powers do not apply when they venture outside of U.S. territory. Stipulating on the record is an excellent solution and it works in all cases, with both U.S. certified and foreign certified reporters (i.e.: British or Canadian reporters). Stipulating on the record is the easiest way to assure the admissibility of your witness's testimony.

Essential travel information for the Dominican Republic

Traveling to the Dominican Republic for a deposition? Get the most out of your visit by brushing up on the culture with these useful travel tips.



CURRENCY

Dominican Republic uses the Dominican Peso. Before you leave, notify your bank, credit card company, or other financial institutions that you are going overseas.



GENERAL TIPPING

Tipping in Dominica is pretty standard. More often than not a service charge will already be included in your price. Be sure to check for service charges when dining in Dominica. If one isn't included you should tip 10%, more often than not the service will be included.

When scheduling an international deposition, we ideally recommend getting started four to six weeks in advance. Of course, it's possible to work within a much shorter timeframe, just keep in mind you need to allow sufficient time for noticing your witness, arranging for resources on the ground (like court reporters, interpreters, conference rooms), and planning travel.

Getting there

3-1 weeks before your deposition

- If the attorney is traveling, be sure to make all travel arrangements, including air, hotel, and any travel insurance or special shipping arrangements for the deposition exhibits. The earlier you book your travel, the cheaper it will be.
- Prepare and send your deposition notices.
- Submit any relevant documents to the case that you would like the team to review prior to the deposition.

Plan ahead

4 weeks before your deposition

- Determine whether the witness in question is willing to be deposed. If the witness is willing, mutual stipulation of the parties can allow for depositions to be planned quickly. If the witness is unwilling, contact us for your options.
- Determine which deposition services will be required:
 - Court reporter (realtime or standard delivery)
 - Legal videographer
 - Deposition interpreter (determine language pair needed)
- Determine where your deposition will take place:
 - Hotel or conference room
 - Videoconferencing facility
 - Web-based videoconferencing (Optima Juris DepoAnywhere™)
- Contact Optima Juris to book your reporter and any other depositions services you require.

Everything has been set...

- Upon conclusion of the deposition, the attorney will place their orders with the court reporter for the transcript and/or video copies.
- Submit payment for transcripts and video, and await the arrival of your order.
